#### Public Consultation on EU Countermeasures

On Thursday, 8 May 2025, the European Commission launched a public consultation on a list of US imports that could become subject to EU countermeasures against the tariffs imposed by the US. This process is expected to shape the final list of products on which the EU will impose measures once the 90-day reciprocal pause expires, and should no other deal between the two parties be reached.

The European Commission is currently considering measures targeting a wide range of imports from the US into the EU, as well as a limited amount of EU exports to the US.

The US imports list (approx. worth €95 billion annually): This list covers a broad selection of agricultural and industrial products, including several categories relevant to the amusement sector:

- Games with screen, operated by coins, banknotes, bank cards,
- tokens or by other means of payment (CN 95043010) • Travelling circuses and travelling menageries (CN 9508100)
- Roller coasters (CN 95082100)
- Carousels, swings and roundabouts (CN 95082200)

The EU export list:

This includes EU-origin products such as steel scrap and chemicals, which the Commission is also considering for potential restrictions.

IAAPA welcomes the European Commission's input-seeking process to this difficult matter. We aim to respond to the European Commission's public consultation. The consultation is open until 10 June 2025.

Once this process is completed, the Commission aims to have the legal act imposing the countermeasures ready to use by early July in case negotiations with the US do not produce a satisfactory result.

## EU to Launch WTO Dispute, Diversify Global Trade

In parallel, the EU will also launch a WTO dispute against the US on its "reciprocal" tariffs and tariffs on cars and car parts, by formally lodging a request for consultations. The two parties will have up to two months to find a mutually agreed solution. If the consultations fail, the EU will be able to request the establishment of a panel, which will assess the merits of the

The Commission continues to monitor the potential diversion of global exports onto the EU market, which might be caused by the US tariffs imposed on third countries. The Commission's dedicated Impact Surveillance Task Force will announce its first results in mid-May.

In addition, the drive to diversify the EU's trade and investment ties with partners around the globe gathers pace, particularly in the Indo-Pacific region where negotiations are underway with India, Indonesia, the Philippines, Thailand and Malaysia.

# UK - US Trade Deal

The UK has secured the first trade agreement with the US since the imposition of tariffs with a deal that lowers the 25% tariffs on cars, steel and aluminium. The UK will be given a quota of 100,000 cars for export under the 10% tariff, with any cars above that level facing a 25% tariff. Talks will continue on other issues like pharmaceuticals, with President Trump announcing a decision on tariffs within the next two weeks.

There is also no change to the **UK's digital services tax** despite strong American pressure. Instead both sides have agreed to work on a digital trade deal. It's also unclear whether the UK will be given any preferential treatment on future tariffs on the film's industry which was hit with a 100% duty on foreign film.

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
